The ever-increasing cost of living is challenging us to find creative ways to save our dollars. The one bill that we all need to keep paying to survive is our groceries, and we can't do anything to reduce it ... or can we?

Places like the Impact Care Services Food Outlet are proving to be a great alternative to the mainstream grocery

stores, with high quality products and at a much more affordable price.

The Food Outlet was formed by Impact Church and is run by trainees and local volunteers. They are open to the community Monday to Friday 9:30 am to 1:30 pm.

A widespread misconception is that services like this are only intended for those who can't otherwise afford groceries. However, Impact welcomes all members of the community. In fact, proceeds fund community-based support programs, so you won't be

taking away from people in need when you shop here. Instead, you'll be supporting locals who need it most – so what are you waiting for?

I encourage you to also investigate the following additional fantastic discount food services, local to us in Division 3: Loaves and Fishes Street Meet Care Services, Tribe of Judah Care Services, Hope Centre Logan, Agape Community Pantry, and Lighthouse Care. All welcome at Logan North Aquatic Centre

The ongoing improvements continue at the Logan North Aquatic Centre in Underwood.

I'm really pleased to share with you the latest completed project, which is a fresh new changerooms and amenities block.

The next time you go for a dip, a day out, or a dunk under the splash pad bucket, you'll discover that you now have a state-of-the-art new facility to get changed in. It includes 5 unisex toilet cubicles (including 2 ambulant compliant cubicles), 5 change cubicles with showers, and external wash basins.

Whole-of-community inclusivity and safety have been the design priorities.

An impressive addition is a fully compliant Changing Places facility

for both adults and children.

Changing Places provides suitable facilities for people who are not accommodated by standard accessible toilets. Therefore, this allows residents with high support needs to enjoy the centre for longer visits, without the concerns of accessing an appropriate toilet.

The newly installed facility will include features like a height-adjustable adult-sized change table, a constant-charging ceiling track hoist system, an automatic door with a clear opening of 950 millimetres at minimum, a centrally-located peninsula toilet, and more circulation space than standard accessible toilets.

As a community, we can be proud to ensure that these new amenities allow for all residents to enjoy our public facilities.

Help co-design our Mabel Park waterway to bring it back to nature!

Council is investing in an innovative naturalisation project for the waterway that runs through Mabel Park.

This exciting project aims to improve habitat for our aquatic and land wildlife while establishing community connection with the waterway.

Around 600 metres of Council-owned land, including a 200-metre concrete-lined channel, will be restored with native plants and nature play spaces.

This \$1.375 million project is co-funded by Logan City Council and the Australian Government.

I would love to hear your ideas on how to co-design this waterway.

The road to Gunungai

Something I'm passionate about as a Councillor is connecting up Division 3 to help everyone get around safely and easily. A huge benefit we have in our part of the city is that we can often get places without a car.

Greater connectivity sometimes requires a big infrastructure project like the Gunungai Bridge, which connected Reserve Park to the service road last year and will eventually join the future dedicated V1 Veloway.

In other instances, small changes – like the new pathway between the disability parking bays to Reserve Park and the Gunungai Bridge – can make all the difference.

Residents Mel and Shane have commented that they see dozens of pedestrians using the new pathway every day to get around the parkland. One of the pedestrians is their grandson Harry, 3, who loves scooting up and down on his trike.
